Topical outline: Most sections of chapters 1 through 5; portions of chapter 7 through 9. We cover topics in proof techniques, logic, sets, relations, functions and number theory. Time permitting, we may discuss an application to Public-Key Cryptography. A certain amount of material not covered in the text may be covered in class.

Goals: Introduce fundamental concepts of mathematics and teach proof-writing skills.

Daily assignments: Homework problems will be posted on the web-site. The homework will not be collected and it is your responsibility to closely follow on all homework problems. Some of the solutions will be posted on the web-site.

Quizzes: There will be weekly 15-minute, usually on Friday. All quizzes are closed-book.

Exams: There will be 3 in-class hour exams. The test dates will be announced on the web-site. All tests are closed-book.

Final exam: The final exam will be comprehensive and closed-book. The final exam will be used to replace the lowest hour exam score if the final exam score is higher. No exemptions on the final exam.

Make-up policy: **There is neither make-up quiz nor make-up exam.** If you are absent on the day of a quiz, you must present a written official proof of your absence if you want to have this quiz canceled from your record. Otherwise you receive no credit.
